Henry is a principal in our Insurance and Health team and is based in the Sydney office.

'I started my career as an associate to Justice O'Loughlin in the Federal Court. I then took a commercial litigation role at a large firm. I became interested in insurance during a backpacking trip, when I saw a beggar on a street in Cairo. He'd had both legs amputated, and he was pursuing the only option open to him. It made me realise the importance of an insurance scheme, which not only protects the individual but also ensures that the system works. When I returned to Australia, I began practising in the area of catastrophic injury. In the late 1990s, when I went to the bar, I broadened my insurance practice and built a pool of clients in matters ranging from common law industrial (including toxic chemicals) and compulsory third party (CTP) insurance, to professional indemnity (especially for medical professionals), public liability and sports law.'

Over the past 20 years, Henry has developed expertise in:

- Compulsory third party (CTP)
- Professional indemnity (including medical defence, accounting and financial services)
- Public liability
- Alternative dispute resolution (ADR).

Henry has particular experience in handling fraudulent and catastrophic injury claims, especially in cases where the medical evidence is complicated. In addition, he has worked on many matters that involve analysing and advising on medical, accounting and engineering evidence.

'I think clients like working with me because I pay attention to what they want, which means listening to them. I try to make the complex simple, and to provide them with an easier way to solve the problem they are facing than they might have come up with themselves.
